


## **Traditional Impact Bond Structure**


Financial flow

- Strong stakeholder alignment on ultimate outcomes versus activities

- Course-correcting design and delivery approaches




#### / EVALUATION

## **Evolution of impact bonds into outcome funds**



#### The motivation



Early demonstration calls for more **experimentation** and expanding opportunities to larger **ecosystems of providers**.



However, **funders involvement** in paying for outcomes has been **slow** – complicated by existing **legal/procurement/financial** management practices that go against RBF.

There are over 100 Impact Bonds worldwide in implementation or completed, of which 9 are in low or middle income countries. This represents an investment of 38 million USD in Impact Bonds in international development.
