October at the World Bank means Annual Meetings, and with them a chance not only to meet with clients, but also to showcase innovations in development. At this year's Annual Meetings (AMs), there were several events that touched on the work of the CDD CoP. One we'd like to highlight was the <u>Technology and Citizen Engagement</u> event on October 12, part of the new World Bank Live series. The animated session featured World Bank CEO Kristalina Georgieva, as well as other speakers like the Hon. Muhammad Sani Abdullahi, a Budget and Planning Commissioner of Nigeria, and David Sasaki of the Hewlett Foundation. The panelists discussed the fundamental role of civic participation on achieving development goals, and showcased the World Bank's focus on social inclusion as a central part of its work.

On the sidelines of the AMs, we also co-sponsored a high-level seminar on the interactions between conflict, aid and development in Myanmar. Chaired by EAP VP Victoria Kwakwa with participation by Executive

Directors, the seminar introduced a <u>new study by the Asia Foundation</u> that highlighted the geographic spread and diversity of conflicts in Myanmar, while identifying ways in which aid can support peace and sustainable development. The report noted in particular the contributions of CDD projects, with their ability to adapt to specific local contexts while delivering at scale.

This issue of the newsletter features stories about how community-driven development is supporting rural mountain communities in Afghanistan and improving maternal and child health in Nepal; as well as two fascinating papers appearing in academic journals.

Feature Story: Life Improves for Thousands in Rural Afghanistan with Upgraded Infrastructure in Villages World Bank

Communities in the mountains of Afghanistan are highly isolated, especially in the winter, when roads are all but impassable. The new Afghanistan Rural Access Project aims to benefit rural communities by improving access to basic services and facilities through all-weather transport linkages. These infrastructural upgrades improved quality of life and boosted local economic growth for more than 20,000 people. Residents themselves participated in project implementation.

Research Paper: On the external validity of social preference games: a systematic lab-field study

Matteo M. Galizzi, Daniel Navarro-Martinez, Management Science, 2017

The authors conducted a series of experimental lab games to assess the external validity of social preferences elicited in a variety of these. Games. They concluded that the social games do a poor job explaining both results from participants' self-reports, and most significantly, behaviors noticed in the field. Social behaviors are varied and complex, especially in naturally occurring settings, and they caution the use of using lab results to predict such social behavior.

Research Paper: Radical Decentralization: Does community driven development work?

Katherine Casey, Stanford Business, 2017 CDD

The central idea of community driven development is to devolve control over the implementation and financial management of development project to communities. Through randomized control trials, Casey found that CDD does effectively deliver public goods and modest economic returns at low cost in difficult environments, but did not find that CDD transforms local decision-making or empowers the poor in the long-term.

Blog: Engaging communities in the Golden 1,000 Days in Nepal

Kaori Oshima and Manav Bhattarai on World Bank's End Poverty In South Asia

The Government of Nepal's Community Action for Nutrition Project, nicknamed "Golden 1000 Days" about a child's critical first two years of development, aimed to reduce malnutrition of women of reproductive age and children under the age of two, and to provide emergency nutrition and sanitation response to vulnerable populations in earthquake affected areas. The project ran from 2012 to 2017 and was supported by the World Bank. Target areas formed community groups that ensured involvement of women in decision-making processes.
