Beyond GDP: A State-Level Just Jobs Index for India by Sabina Dewan

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, India's labour market indicators were showing signs of distress. Among the factors that helped propel these worrisome trends was the pursuit of economic growth underpinned by the assumption that it will inevitably lead to more, and eventually better jobs without due attention to the composition and geography of growth. Capital intensification fueled economic growth for several consecutive years but did not generate enough employment to absorb the country's surplus labour. About 300 million jobs need to be created in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region in the coming 20 years. The Covid-19 crisis may exacerbate this challenge as labor markets are being disrupted at an unprecedented pace. Tourism, for example, which accounted for 6.7 million jobs across the MENA region in 2019, is one of the worst-affected sectors during the crisis. Jobs and Structural Change Blog Series



"The series seeks to relate economic theory to global data to get at the drivers of structural change. It starts with stylized facts, before moving on to discuss different country contexts, and how different workers fare with economic transformation, **Blog#3** shows how both the structure of GDP and employment changes as countries get richer. Agriculture's share of GDP falls as countries get richer, whilst that of services rises. But the share of manufacturing in both GDP and employment first rises for middle income countries, then falls on average. The blog ends by noting that these patterns are explained by changing patterns of consumption and net trade the relative growth of physical and human capital, demographic change and technology adoption. **Blog#4** looks at how the drivers of labor productivity growth vary by income group and how they differ for faster and slower growing countries. Labor productivity drives growth in per capita incomes, and a significant share of labor productivity growth in

agriculture and growth of labor productivity within agriculture. Productivity growth is correlated with growth in the waged share of employment."

The World Bank's Jobs Group started a blog series on employment policy options for the COVID-19 crisis. The series draws on best practices learned from previous crises. But it takes account of what changes in a crisis rooted in a health emergency that calls for people to work from a distance or not at all. It also highlights options for the labor markets of low and middle-income countries with high rates of informal firms and workers.
