Accomplishments Needed

- 1. Creating an appropriate institutional and legal framework (Laws, decrees on the solid waste management sector)
- 2. Improved provision of packaging equipment, pre-collection, collection and transfer of waste by the Private Sect.
- 3. Development of value chains
- 4. Access to financing for cooperatives, improving the sector financing mechanism (TEOM reform, REOM, ecological taxes)
- 5. Capacity building, communication, and awareness











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- <u>Short-term:</u>
 - Sharing and updading the national strategy for SWM by the Coordination Unit for Solid Waste Management

Actions to be Taken

- Launch of a set of technical studies in the framework of PROMOGED by the UCG with the support of the World Bank
- <u>Medium-term:</u>

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• Implementation of the SENEGAL 0 waste project by UCG and possibly donors

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• Starting operation of new waste management infrastructure set up by the Islamic Development Bank and UCG

• Long-term:

- Adoption of the framework law on waste management by the Government of Senegal
- Implementation of new taxes to ensure proper management of the sector and be able to fill the funding gap of the state (eco taxes, fees) by Government of Senegal
- Closure and rehabilitation of the outdated Mbeubeuss landfill and effective operation of the new infrastructures set up by the UCG with the support of the World Bank









- 1. Institutional and legal framework: lack of synergy between the different ministries and lack of devolvement of the political authorities
- 2. Support to the private sector for improved service delivery : Insufficient financial resources and appropriate and adapted incentive mechanisms
- **3.** Development of the supply chain and 3R concept : Insufficient financial resources and lack of appropriate solid waste treatment infrastructure
- **4.** New financing mechanism for waste management : reluctance of the population and private sector actors to contribute to the financing of the sector, and failure of previous reforms
- **5.** Capacities of actors and behavior changes : insufficient financial resources to conduct awareness campaigns and lack of experience in developing environmental education programs and e communication support









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Technical Assistance provided and investment under preparation :

- PROMOGED (Technical Studies) Cost USD \$ 3,000,000 and investment planned for USD \$ 110,000,000 (World Bank, AECID and gorvernement of sénégal)
- PGDSU going investment for USD \$ 30,000,000 (Islamic Developpement Bank)
